

COMMUNITY SERVICE ACTIVITIES

Children and youth are some of the greatest supporters of animals and the work we do at the Seattle Humane. Due to staffing concerns and safety issues, we are unable to offer volunteer positions to people under age 18; however, there are many ways for youth to help the animals in our care! The following list outlines a variety of options for young people to help Seattle Humane while earning school credit. This list is not exhaustive so if you have a unique idea please contact Education Services at educationservices@seattlehumane.org to see if it would benefit our animals.

Knit Blankets For Cats Awaiting Adoption

All of the cats in our care receive a blanket or towel to make their cat cubby more comfortable. The cats especially love knit blankets. This is a great way to learn a new skill, or practice an old one, and benefit the cats on our campus.

Fleece Blankets for Cats and Dogs Awaiting Adoption

We always need blankets for our animals. If you are not into knitting, as mentioned above, you might consider an easier version of making blankets. We take blankets of all sizes, but for cats we suggest at least 18x 20 (or bigger) and for dogs, 40x25 (or bigger).

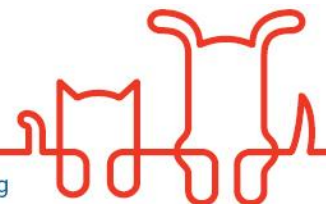
Hold a Cat Toy Drive For Our Cat Enrichment Program

Although the cats in our care receive toys, blankets, and treats on a daily basis, we always try to provide them with as much stimulation as possible. Enrichment can be provided through food (canned food, treats), furniture (scratching posts and stepstools), toys (balls and flyers), activities (clicker training), olfactory stimulants (catnip), and/or auditory stimulants (music and nature sounds). These physical and psychological stimuli provide numerous benefits, such as increasing the cats' overall well-being and their ability to get adopted.

The following items are needed for our Cat Enrichment Program:

- 👉 Toy Shoppe brand playables furry mice (12 pack)
- 👉 Multi-colored lattice balls (4 pack)
- 👉 Toy Shoppe brand mini safari mice (10 pack)
- 👉 Catnip stuffed toys
- 👉 Toy Shoppe brand ticklers
- 👉 Shaker's brand interactive cat toys
- 👉 "Heard that Bird" cat toy with wand

Cat Scratch Toys

Cats have a natural tendency to scratch items as a way to stretch and trim their nails. We are always looking for inexpensive ways for our cats to exercise these natural instincts and homemade cat scratchers are a great option.



Recycled Cardboard Kitty Pad Instructions:

Supplies needed:

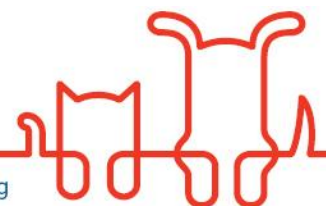
- ✔ cardboard boxes (all sizes, all kinds, at least 5 medium size boxes)
- ✔ masking tape
- ✔ exacto blade and ruler
- ✔ scrap paper, felt, or fabric
- ✔ decorative paper or fabric

Instructions:

- ✔ Choose a height for the pad (pictured above is 4")
- ✔ Measure and cut your cardboard in identical width strips.
- ✔ Cut so that the ridges in the cardboard are going horizontally across the strips.
- ✔ Start rolling the cardboard in your hands and bending at each corrugation, the cardboard will start to curl naturally.
- ✔ Tightly wind one strip into a circle and tape closed. This will be the core of your round.
- ✔ Add a new piece and secure with two pieces of masking tape.
- ✔ Choose which side will be the top and make sure that side is always even. It is less important if the other side is slightly uneven, it will still sit properly and the top will look perfect.
- ✔ Keep adding! Tape each piece right next to the end of the last piece and keep the coiling tight.
- ✔ Cut out a scrap fabric or paper trim; decorate/color; and wrap it around the outside. Glue to outside for trim/decoration.

Kitty Condos

Cats love to hide out in different types of nooks and crannies. If you are interested in building a house similar to the one pictured below we would love to share them with our kitties.

Supplies needed:

- 🐾 Cardboard box
- 🐾 Non-toxic glue
- 🐾 Colored paper/crayons/other crafting materials to decorate a box
- 🐾 Creativity

Note: there are many varieties of these boxes, as such please search the internet for “how to” instructions that best meet your project needs. Also, please label all boxes with the name of the person/group making boxes so we can celebrate these houses and let visitors know who is helping make our kitties more comfortable!



Edible Cat Grass

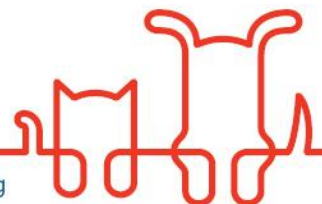
Cats love to eat grass. Help provide grass for our adoptable cats by planting some of your own.

Supplies needed:

- 🐾 Clean cat/dog food cans (small/half sizes)
- 🐾 Potting soil
- 🐾 Cat grass seeds (may be called wheatgrass, as well)

Instructions:

- 🐾 Place 3-6 seeds in bottom of can
- 🐾 Add potting soil up to $\frac{3}{4}$ of can (leave about $\frac{1}{4}$ of can at top)
- 🐾 Add water - just enough to moisten the soil (hint: do not over water as this will prevent seeds from growing)
- 🐾 Place cans in sunny area for a week
- 🐾 Add moisture to soil as it becomes dry throughout the growing process
- 🐾 Over the next two weeks watch your grass bud and bloom into full blades.



Cat Enrichment Toys

This activity uses old tissue boxes and toilet paper rolls and provides hours of entertainment for our cats. This enrichment toy keeps cats engaged and challenges their minds to figure out how to get the treat.

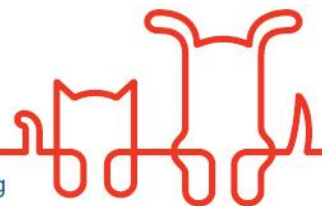
Supplies:

- 🐾 Old Kleenex/facial tissue box
- 🐾 Toilet paper rolls
- 🐾 Zip tie
- 🐾 Hot glue gun and glue sticks
- 🐾 Scissors

Instructions:

- 🐾 Remove top of tissue box and cut two small holes in middle of back panel
- 🐾 Weave zip tie through holes and glue down (this will make it possible to secure box to a chair or other object so that box does not flip over and dump out treats all at once!)
- 🐾 Glue toilet paper tubes to each other and then to inside of tissue box so that nothing moves around
- 🐾 Done! – you have created a toy where cats are challenged to get a treat.

Captivating Catnip Toys

We try to provide a healthy environment for the cats awaiting adoption, which includes giving them plenty of toys. One of their favorites is catnip-filled socks. All you need are baby socks, cotton balls, dried catnip, and a needle and thread.

Instructions:

- 👉 Take a baby sock and fill it with cotton balls
- 👉 Add a wad of catnip in the center – a teaspoon or so should work
- 👉 Sew off the top of the sock and clip any loose threads.
- 👉 You're done!

Dog Bed Cushions

Dog Enrichment Toys

Toy enrichment is one way to curb boredom and present a dog with a fun and challenging task. Snuffle Mats are one way to provide enrichment to dogs and are easy to make. Treats or even whole meals can be hidden in the Snuffle Mat for a hungry dog to sniff out and enjoy! Snuffle Mats are a fun and easy way to exercise their brain while in their kennel by using their keen sense of smell to sniff out the treat inside.

To build your own home made Snuffle Mat follow the following steps:

1. Cut a Rubber Anti-Fatigue mat, or other similar mat to (12 in x 12 in) or (18 in x 20 in). Use care to safely cut the mat to size.



2. Cut fleece fabric into strips of 10 inches by 3-4 inches. You will need approximately 120 strips in total and can use any color or pattern of your choice.





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3. Start in one corner and loop a single piece of fabric between two holes before tying a single knot. Pull knot tight.



4. Continue this process until a single row is completed.



5. Don't stress about it being perfect, your dog will love it no matter what it looks like!







6. Your finished Snuffle Mat will look something like this! All you have to do now is hide the treats and allow your dog to snuffle them out! Snuffle Mats can be hand washed or washed on a delicate washing cycle.







Dog Tug Toys

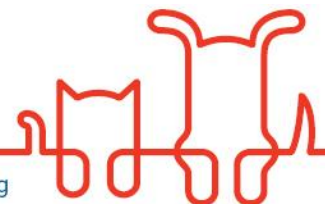
Help our dogs stay engaged with play in their cubbies by making a pull/chew dog toy.

Supplies needed:

-  Old ball (a *tennis ball** works great)
-  About 1/2 yard of Fabric
-  A piece of ribbon
-  Scissors

Instructions:

-  Gather supplies – can use old t-shirts, balls kids no longer use or buy new
-  Cut fabric into two strips - roughly 6" x 14" (can adapt to really any size)
-  Fold the fabric strips in half and wrap around ball (place ball in the center of the folds).
-  Tie your ribbon as tight as you can around the base of the ball after wrapping it several times around





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- 🐾 Cut tail of your fabric into several 2" wide strips; then using three strips at a time braid them into sections. Try to make braids as tight as possible (it's harder for little teeth to rip them apart)
- 🐾 Using excess fabric at the end of each braid tie several knots to keep the braids in place

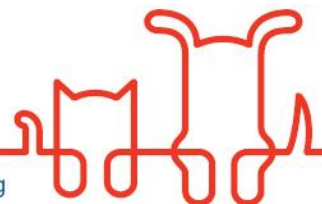


Coordinate A Coin Drive

When the can is full, bring it to the Seattle Humane and replace it with a new one.

Host a Fundraiser

We have had children hold bake sales, yard sales, craft sales, participate in walk-a-thons, and much more! Feel free to use your imagination to come up with a fundraising idea.

Many of these items are distributed through our Pet Food Bank for low-income senior pet owners and through Pet Project, which helps pet owners disabled with AIDS.

Humane Teen Club

The Humane Teen Club is for teens aged 13 to 17 who are interested in learning about companion animal welfare and becoming volunteers at the Seattle Humane before they turn 18. Upon graduation from the program, teens are able to volunteer for various opportunities around campus. The program runs September-June each year and meets on Saturday mornings. Volunteer hours completed by HTC graduates qualify as community service hours for school requirements. In addition, there are various activities throughout the year in teen club to volunteer and earn credit.

When you are ready to come to the shelter to drop off the blankets, towels, animal food, or money donations, please make arrangements with Education Services so that we can also sign off on your hours. Participate In Our Foster Parent Program

If your entire family is interested in helping animals, consider participating in our Foster Parent Program. In this program, volunteer families care for young or ill animals until they are ready for adoption. This is an entire family project, as the animals are in your home for several days or several weeks and may require special feeding and/or medicating.
